Resolution to preserve the Second Amendment of the United States Constitution

WHEREAS, current events have caused our community grave concerns over the preservation and protection of our natural rights, freedoms and specifically the right to bear arms; and



WHEREAS, in order to underscore these unalienable rights, to stand as an example of Constitutional respect and to make a testament to community, citizens and representatives at all levels; and


WHEREAS, the Second Amendment is the paramount right on the Bill of Rights as it assures the ability to defend all the others.


